Executive Course on Oil, Gas and Mining Governance

An executive-level, challenge-focused course for senior professionals and policymakers. Over five days, participants will examine extractive resource management and develop strategies to transform resources into sustained prosperity.

Course Overview

Countries with non-renewable resource wealth face both an opportunity and a challenge. When used well, these resources can create greater prosperity for current and future generations. Squandered, they can cause economic instability, social conflict, and lasting environmental damage. For countries to benefit from resource wealth, citizens and their governments must make a broad range of decisions. Each requires governments to consider complex options and trade-offs, and devise strategies to implement these policy choices. And they must take into account the interests of, and risks borne by, extractive companies, in order to strike a mutually beneficial deal.

This intensive five-day course provides the training and insight required for policy leaders in the public and private sector to work towards better management and governance of oil, gas or mineral resources. The course brings together leaders who have impact on extractive sector development and direction of national extractives policy in order to build a better understanding of the interests of the public and private sectors. We aim to initiate dialogue and mutual appreciation of respective positions between these groups.



The Course Programme

Globally recognised experts and academics have developed this course to encourage public and private sector leaders from multiple countries to share their own experiences, while gaining insights and specialist knowledge about natural resource management.

The 2018 course will look at both technical policy aspects of managing resource and the complex interplay between governments, companies and citizens.

Topics that will be covered include:

- Licensing and discovering minerals
- Taxing companies and combating tax abuses
- Directing state-owned enterprises
- Protecting local societies and the environment
- Managing revenues and investment
- Communicating with citizens
- Implementing your strategy and ensuring accountability

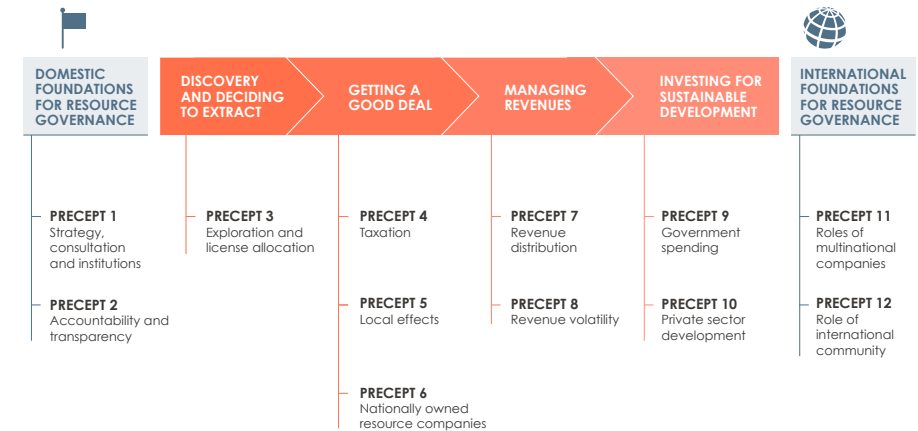

On completion of the course, participants will have a clear understanding of the elements of a national natural resource strategy and the ability to lead in, or influence, the formation of effective policies for the governance of these natural resources.



Course Structure



The course uses the Natural Resource Charter (above) as a guiding framework. The charter is organised around 12 core precepts offering guidance on key decisions governments face, beginning with whether to extract resources and ending with how generated revenue can produce maximum good for citizens.

Built around these precepts, the course consists of three core components:

- Extractive sector decisions
- Revenue management decisions
- Governance foundations

All sessions are uniquely structured to explore a variety of challenging issues around each component, such as how to manage revenues wisely, how to get the best out of a national legislature, and how to combat tax abuse.

Application Process

Who should apply?

This course is open to policy leaders in the public and private sector, alongside those in senior research and non-profit roles, who are committed to better governance in natural resources, and in a position to influence the governance of these sectors.

Participant Profile

Prospective participants include:

- Ministers, chiefs of staff, heads of extractives state-owned enterprises, commissioners, heads of agencies, departments and other public bodies involved in the management of oil, gas and mining and the revenues they generate as well as their deputies and advisors
- Executives, directors, chiefs and heads at oil, gas and mining companies, at headquarters or country office levels, as well as their deputies and advisors
- Leaders from management consulting firms providing advice to governments in resource-rich countries in extractive sector policy design and implementation or public financial management
- Vice-presidents, deputy managing directors, and head of departments at multilateral agencies, such as the IMF and World Bank
- Chief executives, directors and senior fellows at think tanks and nonpartisan bodies

Participants should have at least twelve years' experience and be in a senior leadership position or advisory role.

Applications are due by 1 June 2018. If spaces are available, applications may be accepted past the due date on a rolling basis.

Applicants will be asked to submit the following documentation:

- A current résumé/CV
- A brief personal statement addressing the governance challenges associated with the extractive industries in the applicant's country of origin/residence, and the applicant's expectations about how the course will benefit them in addressing those challenges
- Bursary application (if applicable)

Course Dates and Attendance Costs

The course will take place at the Blavatnik School of Government in Oxford, UK, 10–14 September 2018. The course is delivered in English.



The total cost of the course is £8,000. This includes tuition over five days from world-class experts and academics, and six nights accommodation, and most meals. The course fee does not cover overseas transport, visas or other incidentals.

Full Scholarship

A limited number of scholarships covering the full cost of tuition and travel are available to public sector applicants from select resource-rich countries: Colombia, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ghana, Guinea, Indonesia, Libya, Mexico, Mongolia, Myanmar, Nigeria, Tanzania, Tunisia and Uganda.

Partial Scholarship

In addition, the Blavatnik School will offer a limited number of partial-bursaries on a competitive basis to applicants. Applicants must cover their own travel and incidental costs. A bursary application must be completed by the closing date to be eligible for these awards.

We strongly encourage female applicants to apply, with a number of bursary and scholarship opportunities currently available to help support current and rising female leaders in the natural resource sector.
